Course Selections at CDHS for 2023-2024



Course selections are due to be submitting in my My Blueprint NO later than February 10th 2023.

Course selections for the 2023-2024 school year are now OPEN! Course selections are completed through the My Blue Print program. This is your complete guide to completing your course selections for the next school year. Here are the highlights of everything you need.

- A copy of your most up to date Credit list is shown in My Blue Print in the course planner. A grad summary will also be provided by guidance. This shows all the courses that you have taken and are currently taking this year. It also shows a summary of the courses that you are still required to take to meet the requirements of your OSSD.
- 2. Course Section notes are provided in this document based on the grade that you are going into next year. Refer to the notes when selecting courses to reduce errors and issues. There are additional resources provided for Grade 9's selecting streamed classes for grade 10.
- Course Summary Chart for 2023-2024 School Year. Note that some courses are offered in alternate
 years and not every year. This makes it super important to make a tentative plan of your courses in
 future years so that you don't miss out on a credit of interest.
- 4. A reference chart of the Ministry requirements for an OSSD, including a breakdown of the 18 required compulsory courses as well as the Group credit descriptions and the links to support Post-Secondary Research for Apprenticeships, Colleges, and Universities.
- 5. CDHS Course Planner for those who like to have a hard copy of the plan that matches the plan you create in My Blueprint. ** Remember if you are planning to enroll in a SHSM please see Mrs Murray for an enrollment form.
- 6. Researching Post-Secondary handout with links to help research program requirements.

 have achieved in that subject. The course descriptions offer suggested marks to help direct you to

- There are additional reference pages following that will support your selection of courses in grade 10 for the pathways you are interested in after high school.
- Be mindful of courses offered in alternate years and plan accordingly.
- Choose electives that could count as Group 1, 2 or 3 but there are opportunities in Grade 11 to get these completed.
- Choose electives that provide opportunity to try out courses that are possible pathways in grade 11 &
 12.
- It is a Ministry requirement that students take 2 elearning courses to earn their OSSD. If you would like to opt-out of this requirement please get an opt out form from the guidance office.
- Extended French students are required to pick FEF2D and GLC2OF & CHV2OF or CHC 2D, to remain on track for the completion of the Extended French Certificate requirements. The GLC/CHV and CHC courses alternate each school year. Extended French students who completed CHC2DF in Grade 9, are not required to select History in their grade 10 selections and can select an additional elective and students who completed GLC2OF and CHV2OF in grade 9 will not be required to pick that course in grade 10.



Pathway Planning Guide for Grade 9's



We are all stakeholders in student pathway planning and play a vital role in ensuring that our students find success through this process! Course marks, learning skills, teachers, and guidance counsellors can help inform the decision-making process and can help ensure that every student

is on their path to success. Post-secondary pathways include a variety of options and can be adapted to fit student needs at any point in time. There are many ways (direct and indirect) that can get students where they want to be.

Students are responsible for:


- Exploring pathway opportunities to outline potential pathway plans
- Choosing courses that support the pathway plan(s)
- Asking questions in order to understand how course selections impact their pathway plan(s)
- Setting goals to ensure success

Parents/Guardians are responsible for:

- Helping their student choose the courses most appropriate for their student's pathway plan
- Connecting with the school, as they will highlight course information and help direct pathway thinking

Using myBlueprint To Help!

- MyBlueprint is the platform used in KPR for course selections.
 MyBlueprint can give students greater breadth and depth of understanding job/career pathways.
- Students will work with teachers at school and can also log in at home to:
- Identify future career/job opportunities that interest them
- Explore/identify the apprenticeship/college/ university opportunities available
- Determine the grade 11 and 12 credits that are required for acceptance
- Map the correct prerequisite grade 10 courses www.myblueprint.ca/kawartha
- Complete interest surveys and Individual Pathway Plan activities that can help connect students with possible pathway opportunities



What Are the Course Options in Grade 10

One big decision made by students throughout high school is choosing the appropriate courses for their desired pathway. In grade nine, core courses are destreamed which gives all students a chance to settle into high school and set themselves up for success. Students in grade nine must then choose 8 grade ten courses to prepare them for their desired pathway.


Applied (e.g. - ENG 2P), Locally Developed (e.g. - ENG 2L), Academic (e.g. - ENG 2D), and Open (e.g. -TIJ 2O) course types are options for students. The 5th character in the course code (L, P, D or O) denotes the course type. These are outlined in myBlueprint as selectable course options. Teachers, guidance counsellors, and Special Education Resource teachers, can help support the course selection process. It is expected that any student moving into Locally Developed pathways connect with the school Special Education Resource teacher.

There are opportunities for students to change course selections in April as they develop as grade nine learners. Connecting with a guidance counsellor will be necessary when any changes need to be made. **Grade 10 Course Requirements:**

- Choose electives that could count as Group 1, 2 or 3 Coop is a great option
- Be mindful of pre-requisites courses required for admissions for post-secondary programs.
- Be mindful of courses offered in alternate years and plan accordingly.
- It is a Ministry requirement that students take 2 elearning courses to earn their OSSD. If you would like to opt-out of this requirement please get an opt out form from the guidance office.
- Extended French students are required to pick FEF3U in their Grade 11 year to remain on track for the completion of the Extended French Certificate requirements. CGG3OF or an alternate Extended French credit will be required in grade 11 or 12. To accommodate taking a grade 11 course in grade 12 any Extended French students in a university pathway are recommended to select one grade 12 U or M credit. This will ensure the ability to use both spares in grade 12 and have at least 6 grade 12 U/M credits for university application. *Plan out BOTH your grade 11 and 12 years in the planner.

Victory Lap Course Selection Notes



A victory lap, or a 5th year of study for a student who has successfully completed their OSSD, at CDHS does require course selections be completed and are subject to approval by Administration. If you require a 5th year to earn your OSSD then approval is not required and students are advised to review the grade 12 course selection notes.

- Completion of 40 Hours of Community Involvement. Hours can be submitted directly to guidance through a Google Form found in Edsby School Talk or this QR Code
- Two E-Learning credits. There is an option to opt out of this requirement by completing the parent opt-out form. Completion of the form removed it as a requirement, but students are still able to take an eLearning course should they choose to.
- Successful Completion of the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test, which is attempted in grade 10. Should a student not be successful they are offered a second attempt, or they are enrolled in the OLC4O course in their final year of high school.

Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP)



The Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program allows Ontario secondary school students to fast track into a skilled trade of their choice. There are <u>two types</u> of OYAP opportunities available to students:

The first option is a unique combination of in-school trades training and a high school Cooperative Education Program. Students are registered as apprentices and attend a Trades School one to three days a week to earn their Level 1 trade qualification. Students spend the remainder of the week at work placements earning two to three high school credits while accumulating hours toward their apprenticeship requirements. This full-day program takes place during the second semester of their grade 12 year.

- Positions in this program are only available to students in Grade 12 who are eligible to graduate.
- Students who return for a fifth year will only be allowed to participate with special permission.
- Student involvement hours must be completed and documented when the program commences.
- Candidates demonstrating success in the recommended Math, Science, English, and Technological Studies will be interviewed by a panel from both education and industry to gain entrance into the program.
- Successful candidates will require registration in a two or three credit Cooperative Education
 Program. A related Cooperative Education placement during Grade 11 is highly
 recommended. Where possible, enrollment in a related Specialist High Skills Major
 program is also an asset.
- A transportation allowance is available to subsidize the cost of attending the Training Delivery Agent.
- The cost of training is absorbed by the Ministry of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development.

Note: In some cases, OYAP Level 1 program students will receive Dual Credits along with their Co-op credits. For further information about Dual Credits, speak to a Guidance Counsellor at your school.

A second form of OYAP participation is available to any Cooperative Education student, with a placement in a skilled trade, who is at least 15 years of age and has 14 credits. These OYAP students do not complete their trade's Basic Level 1 certification. Instead, Student Learning Plans are developed for them based on training standards for their trade.

- Students can be registered as apprentices and apply any competencies achieved through their Co-op placement toward their apprenticeship.
- An OYAP student in this program can participate in any of 144 recognized trades and potentially earn between two and four secondary credits.

The Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP)



The Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP) is a school-to-work transition program offered through Ontario secondary schools.

Co-op students in a skilled trade or <u>Apprenticeship</u> placement become OYAP participants when they complete and submit the OYAP Participant form. To qualify for OYAP the student must be at least 15 years old with at least 14 credits. To take advantage of this opportunity, students must be enrolled in Cooperative Education. An OYAP Participant may become a Registered Apprentice if the employer agrees to sponsor the student.

How to start

Compulsory Trades...

Compulsory trades can only be worked in by apprentices and licensed journeypersons. All compulsory trades have certifying exams. Skilled tradespeople in compulsory trades must renew their Certificate of Qualification each year.

Apprenticeship Post-Secondary Pathways....

Path A

Find an employer and get to work - sign a Registered Training Agreement (for Compulsory Trades this is a must), learn and earn on the job, attend in-school training (for apprentices - those with a RTA) when seats come up at Training Delivery Agents (schools licensed to train apprentices). Write a Certificate of Qualification exam for trades where this is an option/requirement. Become a Qualified Journeyperson.

Path B

College can be an option to gain experience, skills and build your resume to make yourself more hireable. If you are interested in a Compulsory Trade, you will need to move to Path A and Find an employer and get to work.






